Please describe the type of assistance you think you will need in case of an emergency evacuation:

Family Members: No special needs. Mary Jo does take thyroid & blood pressure medicine.

Animals:

- 1. If a horse trailer is needed, we have two. Both are goosenecks. The gray trailer has a divider in the middle, so depending on the size of the horses, you could get 2-6 horses in the trailer. 3 small horses will fit in the white trailer.**
- 2. I have one horse; she normally loads easy if you are on the left hand side and she is to your right. If she won't load, you can either have someone from behind tap her on the butt, or put the rope thru the side (going to the outside) and then you can kind of pull her in. Once started, she normally jumps right into the trailer. She doesn't "have" to be tied in a stock trailer, but if someone would put her into a two-horse trailer that is narrow, you need to tie her because she will try to turn around. She will back out of a trailer, but if there's any room at all, she'll try to turn around since she's use to the stock trailer.**
- 3. At least one bale of hay is in the gray trailer. Hay storage is in the white trailer right next to the horse shelter. This trailer is not a horse trailer, but could be used for hauling materials or equipment.**
- 4. Two Puppies: Diablo is the male (bigger and brown, black and tan). Katie is the female (black and white primarily). I do not know if they would go with a stranger or not. However, I'm sure if you had a treat of some sort, they would probably come to you. The male may jump on you. To our knowledge, they will not bite; however, if you try to pull them or push into something, they'll probably growl (again, this is normal for them). They're never been aggressive.**
- 5. Vaccination shots for all animals are given sometime between May and June every year.**
